### A short trip in time!

In November a group of History and ASDAN students left campus on one of the shortest History trips ever - a mere 500 metres along the pavement from NCW! The top of Red Hill is where the gallows were sited in Worcester and, in the centre of the Whittington Gate development, there is a memorial to a number of Catholic clergy who were executed in the seventeenth century.

Students enjoy the fireworks around Bonfire Night but don't always realise that some of the people accused of involvement in the Gunpowder Plot, one of the most famous assassination attempts made on a Monarch

in history, were executed so close to NCW. Worcestershire features strongly in the story of the Gunpowder Plot with several powerful Catholic families living in the great houses of the county. Sir Richard Walsh, the sheriff of Worcestershire, was ordered to hunt for the plotters and Humphrey Lyttleton, John Wintour, Ralph Ashley, a man called Perks (no relation to our Mrs Perks, we hope) and Father Oldcorne were all arrested in Worcestershire and thrown into Worcester Castle! Did you also know that the person responsible for starting the uprising, Robert Catesby, was shot and killed by John Streete, a Worcester clothier serving in the militia at the time. For shooting the ring leader

Catesby, the King gifted him a pension of two shillings a day for the rest of his life!

What a lot of history on our doorstep!
