Derek Paravicini Concert

We were honoured at the end of the term to have a visit from musical Savant Derek Paravicini.

Derek is the most incredible musician; he has absolute pitch and can play a piece of music having only heard it once. He came along with his official biographer, Adam Ockelford, who wrote "In the Key of Genius: The Extraordinary Life of Derek Paravicini". Adam is Professor of Music and Director of the Applied Music Research Centre at the University of Roehampton and is also the Founder and Trustee of The Amber Trust, a UK-wide charity that supports blind and partially sighted children and young people in their pursuit of music.

Many, many NCW students have benefited from the generosity of The Amber Trust over the years, receiving funding for instruments and instrumental lessons. Before the concert Derek and Adam were able to meet some current NCW students who are benefiting from the Trust.

The chapel was packed with students and staff enjoying the concert, marvelling at

Derek's breath-taking talent and the speed and accuracy of his playing. Some of the students were also able to get involved, perform for Derek and play alongside.

It was a magical morning, thank you so much to Derek and Adam for coming along and for the continued support for students from The Amber Trust.

NCW had a trip of a lifetime learning to ski in the glorious Italian Alps.

Setting off from NCW by minibus, spirits were sky high on the short drive to Birmingham airport. This was followed by a smooth two hour flight to Turin and a quick bus transfer to Sauze d'Oulx and the group had reached their resort where they would then have a full four days of skiing on the slopes.

The trip was arranged by our travel partners, Seable, who provide accessible tailored holidays to the vision-impaired community.

The students had five hours of ski lessons each day from Sciabile, an established organisation which enables people with various types of disabilities to participate in skiing and snowboarding in Sauze d'Oulx. Students and staff enjoyed breakfast and evening meals at the hotel and then had lunch at restaurants on the mountains.

Activities Coordinator Phil Bresnan says, "My favourite part was watching each student graduate from the nursery slope and head on to the mountain. It was amazing! All the students were exhausted at the end - what a great six days!"

Head student Amy said, "The ski trip was a great opportunity for me to learn a new skill with a qualified instructor. We are all extremely grateful for having the opportunity to attend. It is extremely hard for me to pick a highlight. The three words I thought of to describe the experience were "unforgettable, life-changing and magical". This has been an experience that I will never forget and I hope to go skiing again soon. I would also like to take the opportunity here to thank the staff who came with us, we would not have been able to do this trip without them."

Judo success for Rico...again!

Sixth Form student Rico is a champion judoka and has come back from the British School Judo Championships with a medal in his hand!

We caught up with Rico to find out about the competition, "I fought in the British Schools Judo Championships on 10th March. The competition comprised of a VI section and a section with people with additional needs. I fought the VI section. Although I won the gold medal, the people who I fought against were members of my Paralympic potential squad, so that was quite hard as we train together and know each other very well! I would like to say well done to them for their efforts. One of my highlights was beating someone who I had previously lost to. This was made even better because he is a left-hander which is an issue for a right-hander in judo. The training also went well for the competition in regard to fitness work. I also managed to use one of my best techniques. I would like to thank my coaches for getting me through the training sessions, coaching me on competition day and helping me to win the medal. I would also like to thank my family and supporters as well."

Braille Art Competition

We are delighted to announce that NCW came a runner up in the Schools category of this year's Braille **Art Competition!**

Each year our charity partners VICTA run a Braille Art Competition which is open to all young people with a vision impairment aged 0 to 29 years. The challenge this year was to create a piece of Braille art with the theme of 'time'. Time is the 2024 theme for British Science Week and entrants were tasked with being as imaginative as possible.

As always, NCW students were keen to enter and took to the drawing board to plan their ideas. Inspiration and creativity levels were sky high and after many hours of work, 12 pieces were submitted.

Congratulations to all the winners! Here are a few of the submissions from NCW students.



Aliyah, age 12 - 'Seasons'

Aliyah has created four tactile images from air drying clay to represent each of the seasons and positioned them next to the name of the season in braille. Autumn is a brown leaf, winter is a white snowflake, spring is a yellow flower and summer is a chocolate ice cream in an orange waffle cone.



Darcy, age 11- 'Tea Time'

Darcy has created what looks like a pizza with a slice taken from it. Cream tissue paper is sandwiched between two card shapes. They have decorated it with tomato shapes made from textured red paper and shiny green foil paper.



Finn, age 12 - 'Clock'

Finn has made a 3D clock from card with a white paper face. The numbers are set in braille using different coloured pompoms. He has made arrow-shapes clock hands and coloured them in black - they are attached using a split pin so that you can turn them.



Ellie, age 13 - 'Fossil Fish'

Ellie has used a branch with lots of smaller branches shooting off the sides to represent the shape of a fish fossil. She has glued white paper over the top to form a tactile image.



Rory, age 11 - 'My Favourite Time of the Day, Breakfast with Toast and Jam'

Rory has created an image of a clock - he has stuck down yellow tissue paper and then a rectangle of foil for the screen. The time stuck on top is 8:15. There are three pom poms at the top and a wiggly yellow pipe cleaner for the wire. In the bottom left is a paper plate with corrugated card for the toast and ripped, textured, red card for the jam.



Maxwell, age 14 - 'My Favourite Time on a Train'

Maxwell has printed an image of a modern train and painted it. He has stuck Wikki Stix around the edges to make the shape of the train tactile.











Lionel Bart's Oliver!

Lionel Bart's "Oliver!" tells us the story of orphan Oliver (Khadijah), who has been growing up in a workhouse in Victorian England. On escaping workhouse life, he finds himself amongst a group of petty thieves and pickpockets and so begins a whirlwind adventure with lovable rogue, the Artful Dodger (George C) under the watchful eye of small crime mastermind Fagin (Mr Painter). These pieces, however, are perfect to feel and explore the story of Royal Worcester. I also talk about their sensory trail, which shows Royal Worcester pieces through the senses, there

are things to smell and touch. There is also a piece of writing in braille to accompany each piece. I also add to their social media to promote the work I do, including my piece of the week, where I choose one piece a week from the handling collection to talk about. I do it every Thursday afternoon, 2-4 pm and I love it! I am so lucky to have this opportunity as I would like to do a degree in history one day."
