The visit included train and bus travel, navigating Birkbeck University's campus, and managing key tasks like route planning, requesting Passenger Assist services and confidently self-advocating. These are all part of the essential independence skills students develop at NCW.

funding




An episode of BBC Radio 4's In Touch programme was dedicated to shining a spotlight on the vital role of specialist education for vision impaired students.

Another trip took Year 7 to The Commandery, a key site in the story of the English Civil War. The students are currently learning about the war in class, so this visit brought the history to life! From trying on replica Civil War clothing

to exploring weaponry and discovering the building's many uses over the centuries, there was something to captivate everyone. It was hard to believe that this now central building was once surrounded by countryside outside the city walls.

As the end of the year approaches, it's a great time to get out and about! With trips to the beach, museums and castles, what a great way to end the term.
