National Archive Visit


NCW students again benefitted from the experience of visiting the National Archives in Kew. Year 11 and Sixth Form History and Politics students went into the Repository and saw the shelves containing maps and boxes of other materials, as well as a large lump of rock salt (from the former salt mine Cheshire store).

They discovered the processes underlying how Government documents are preserved and stored. They then took part in a workshop studying primary source material on Elizabeth I. We were pleased again to meet George Rhodes of All Able Ltd who, with the advice of Kate Antolak, had 3D printed some visual sources and this added to the understanding of representations of the past.

Two of the Politics group came along, with one of them, and a member of staff who acted



as reader, really enjoying looking through a file of Harold Wilson's letters around the Common Market referendum of 1975 to aid his Extended Project Qualification on the career of the British Labour politician Tony Benn; it definitely had echoes of 'Yes Minister'. Kyla said it 'blew her mind' to touch a document touched by Elizabeth I. Liv said the whole day was fascinating and she loved connecting with the past. Thanks to the Education Team at the National Archives for providing us with such a valuable experience.

They embraced the challenge of speaking Spanish with native speakers, ordering food in the target language and engaging in real conversations that tested their vocabulary and confidence. Alongside the linguistic benefits, the students broadened their cultural horizons by trying traditional foods such as arepas and pandebono and learning about their origins.

Cesar, Francini's owner, was delighted when our students offered to Braille the menu in both Spanish and English. This is a unique skill — very few people master both Braille codes, which differ significantly between the two languages. It's a wonderful example of how NCW students combine language learning with accessibility and inclusion.




Swimming Gala

Amazing!"*

Mrs Price, Head of PE at NCW and originally from New Zealand joined in the fun despite her home team losing to England for the first time at home for thirteen years!

NCW Alumni inducted into National Football Museum's Hall of Fame.

Former NCW student and Paralympian, Darren Harris, England's most capped and decorated blind footballer, has been inducted into the National Football Museum's Hall of Fame.

Darren made his debut for the country's blind team in 1996 and went on to make 157 appearances, scoring 34 goals while winning 10 world and European medals.

The 52-year-old, from Wolverhampton, took up the sport after losing his sight when he was diagnosed with bilateral retinoblastoma when he was 15 months old. Six years after his England debut, he became captain in 2002 and helped the team qualify for the Athens Paralympic Games in 2004. He switched to training full-time in Judo, competing at the Beijing Paralympics in 2008, before returning to football to play at the London Paralympics in 2012.

Since his retirement, he has worked as a motivational speaker, performance consultant and inclusion advocate, championing accessibility.

Tim Desmond, CEO of the National Football Museum, said Harris was a "remarkable athlete and role model".

"His achievements on the pitch were extraordinary but it is his impact off the pitch, challenging perceptions, empowering others and championing inclusion, that truly sets him apart."

Harris was inducted into the hall of fame at the National Football Museum in Manchester during the Para Sport Awards on 5th December.
